This week I am revisiting the antics of the childhood heroes, the Looney Tunes. We're taking a look at the 1996 film that brought Bugs Bunny and Michael Jordan together for 88 intense, funloving, wacky minutes for our viewing pleasure. That's right; I'm talking about Space Jam.

Roger Ebert called it "a happy marriage of good ideas." Space Jam's plot is simple. The Looney Tunes are threatened with slavery by the proprietor of an intergalactic theme park (as voiced by the one and only Danny DeVito), take the Looney way out when deciding on a challenge to keep their freedom, confront the bad guy's idiotic henchmen rather poorly, and have to enlist a self-proclaimed baseball player to win a basketball game.

Add the voice of a much younger and less funny Billy West and the acting talents of Bill Murray to play himself being mistaken for Dan Aykroyd (of GhostBusters fame), and you have yourself a movie. And what 90s movie is complete without a celebrity cameo or cheap 3D effects?
